Welcome to the third CESSDA Newsletter of 2025!



The end of the year 2025 is approaching and many of us are looking forward to wrapping up the work before the holiday season.

For CESSDA, 2025 was a busy year between participating in EC projects and preparing new ones. In 2026 CESSDA will engage in more AI related activities. A new CESSDA Core Working Group on AI was created in October, dedicated to topics such as impact on AI for Data archives, ethical AI, and working on best practices and recommendations.

The Data Citation Working Group also prepared the Data Citation Guide with a set of recommendations for different stakeholder groups. As did the Core Working Group on Trust and Landscape, which oversees the research data management landscape and the FIDELIS project.

In autumn, I had the opportunity to take part at the International Science Data Week in Brisbane, Australia to liaise with partner organisations and international colleagues as well present the challenges and opportunities of sensitive data in the social sciences at [ANDOR \(assises national de la recherche ouverte\)](#), an initiative of the French government on open science in Paris.

The EOSC federation, with its 14 pilot EOSC nodes, was officially launched in November at the [EOSC Symposium in Brussels](#). CESSDA is not part of the first waves for becoming a node, but serves as a pilot for becoming a node in the context of the OSTRails project. Overall, CESSDA is well represented in EOSC through its many Service Providers and the Main Office in different EOSC working groups and other activities, such as in writing the EOSC interoperability handbook.

Finally, at the ERIC Forum meeting in late November I was elected as ERIC Forum Chair starting in January 2026. The elected Vice-Chair is Eija Juurola from ACTRIS, a distributed ERIC in the

Environmental Sciences. It is an honour to chair the ERIC Forum, and I am looking forward to working with my colleagues from CESSDA, the Science Clusters, and the now 32 ERICs.

In the spotlight

Collaboration, Community, and the Future of Open Science at the EOSC Symposium 2025

At this year's EOSC Symposium in Brussels, CESSDA and seven of our Service Providers joined nearly 500 participants to explore how Europe can build a trusted, secure, and truly federated environment for FAIR data and services. With a programme rich in keynotes, panels, and hands-on demonstrations, the event highlighted the rapid development of the EOSC Federation and the vital role research infrastructures play in shaping Europe's evolving data landscape.

From expert contributions on long-term data retention and trustworthy repositories to exchanges on skills, governance, and data sovereignty, CESSDA's network made a strong impact throughout the three days. Director Bonnie Wolff-Boenisch and colleagues from the Main Office connected with partners old and new, reinforcing CESSDA's commitment to widening participation and supporting a collaborative European Open Science ecosystem.

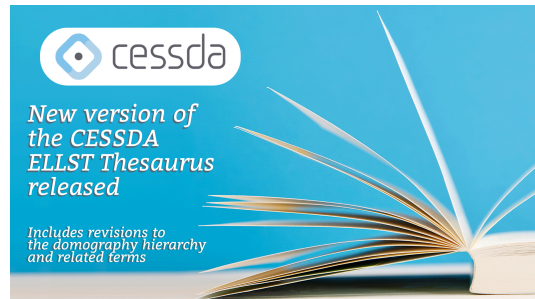

New version of the ELSST Thesaurus released

[The European Language Social Science Thesaurus](#) (ELSST) is a broad-based, multilingual thesaurus for the social sciences. It is available in fifteen languages: Czech, Dutch, English, Finnish, French, German, Greek, Hungarian, Icelandic, Lithuanian, Norwegian, Romanian, Slovenian, Spanish and Swedish.

The November 2025 release of ELSST (Version 6) includes revisions to the demography hierarchy and related terms. The revision was needed to ensure that the thesaurus reflects modern society and meets ELSST's stated aims of diversity and inclusivity.

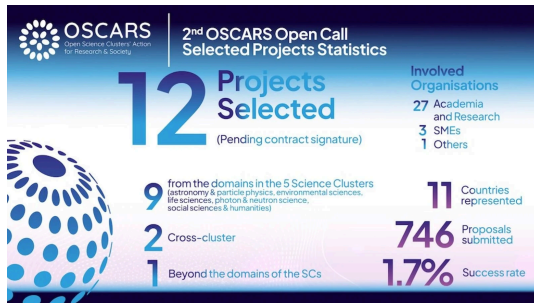
New report highlights progress in Data Citation Practices across CESSDA

A new report from the [CESSDA Data Citation Working Group](#) reveals that CESSDA's Service Providers (SPs) across Europe are making significant progress in promoting and implementing consistent data citation practices.

The Monitoring Report 2024–2025: Data Citation Practices among CESSDA Service Providers reviews how repositories are putting CESSDA's Data Citation Recommendations into practice. It finds that data citation is becoming a well-established norm within the CESSDA community, and that Service Providers are taking concrete steps to make citation easier, clearer, and more consistent.

2nd OSCARS Open Call concludes with 12 projects selected

The second OSCARS Open Call for Open Science Projects and Services has concluded, with 12 projects selected for funding from 710 eligible applications, a strong response that underscores the research community's

engagement with the [OSCARS programme](#).

Despite a residual budget of €3 million, the call attracted 746 submissions (compared to 264 in the first call), requesting a total of €173 million.

Highlights from European Commission projects

Datasets on all I4NG pillars released

During the last few months, the Infra4NextGen project has released datasets and accompanying summaries for all five of the projects pillars: Make it... Strong, Healthy, Green, Equal, and Digital.

Make it Healthy and Make it Digital:

The first report, [The Digital Divide across Europe](#) (published 4 September), provides a descriptive overview of young people's access to and use of digital technologies. The analysis



highlights differences in digital skills, opportunities, and risks by age, gender, education, and place of living. The second report, [The Health and Wellbeing of People in Europe](#) (published 11 September), focuses on the social determinants of health. Researchers examined behavioural and psychosocial factors, material conditions, occupational

situations, and access to healthcare.

Make it Equal

The third report, [Inequalities in Europe: From Personal Experiences to Policy Preferences](#), draws on data from the European Social Survey, European Quality of Life Survey, International Social Survey Programme, the Gender and Generations Survey, and the Infra4NextGen-funded CRONOS-3 panel, and examines how younger Europeans (under 35) perceive and experience inequality compared to older generations.

Make it Green

The fourth report, [European Attitudes to Climate Change and the Environment](#), examines how Europeans, particularly those under 35, view climate change, the environment, and policies for a sustainable future. It explores awareness, concern, perceived responsibility, and willingness to

act, drawing on extensive data from the European Social Survey (ESS), European Values Study (EVS), and International Social Survey Programme (ISSP).

Drawing on data from the European Social Survey, Generations and Gender Survey, and International Social Survey Programme, the fifth report, [Make it Strong: Building a Resilient Europe](#), analyses how perceptions differ across age, gender, education, and where people live. It provides evidence for initiatives under NextGenerationEU, and demonstrates how combining multiple data sources can illuminate key social challenges.

Increased support for SASD opens new avenues

Recently, CESSDA's Slovakian Service Provider, the Slovak Archive of Social Data (SASD), has experienced a notable strengthening of its institutional foundations and collaborative reach. Since 2025, the Slovak Ministry of Education has increased its

support for SASD, recognizing the archive's role in advancing open science and data accessibility. This enhanced support enabled the creation of a new position within the archive in 2025 and is expected to facilitate the establishment of additional roles in 2026, further reinforcing our operational capacity.

Open Science Festival Insights, Ice Cream, Inspiration: Vienna celebrated its first Open Science Festival

At the festival premiere in Austria, Open Science fans got together and shared experiences, knowledge and their love of ice cream.

The Open Science Festival celebrated its premiere in Austria this year: On 8 and 9 September 2025, Open Science enthusiasts gathered on the campus of the University of Vienna for inspiring keynotes and expert panels, fun activities such as quizzes and a scavenger hunt, and practical workshops. Based on a successful concept from the Netherlands, the festival provided an ideal opportunity for researchers, lecturers and research support staff to exchange ideas and network with colleagues from Austria and several other European countries.

Sharing is caring – in every way

The interactive workshop "Doing Open Science: Turning Requirements into Opportunities" focused on bringing Open Science principles to life: AUSSDA communications expert Julia Geistberger, Claudia Hackl from the Center for Teaching and Learning at the University of Vienna

and Lisa Hönegger, head of the Research Data Management team at the Vienna University Library, introduced participants to the topics of open data, open source tools, open access, open education and citizen science using a fictional research project as an example. In groups, participants collected ideas on how these principles could be best put into practice. The end result was the realisation that Open Science is not an insurmountable challenge, but rather a series of individual, feasible steps that bring concrete benefits to researchers.

For instance, sharing research data in a repository enables others to reuse it, such as students who need data for their theses. In the workshop 'Finding Suitable Research Thesis Data', Otto Bodi-Fernandez and Dimitri Prandner, AUSSDA representatives from Graz and Linz, and Monika Bargmann, Data Steward at the Vienna University Library, explained how to find and reuse suitable datasets.

The festival visitors' enthusiasm for Open Science had to be rewarded with treats, so AUSSDA sponsored an ice cream van by Vanella Gelato in Vienna. The ice cream experts handed out delicious flavours to everyone who attended the festival, because sharing is caring – that goes for both research data and ice cream!

What's next?

To keep the festival momentum going, the organisers put together a follow-up event: There will be two online sessions on 13 October focusing on a more sustainable, healthier research culture and tips for overcoming challenges Open Science can bring. The best thing is: Everyone is more than welcome to participate in the sessions, regardless of whether they attended the festival or not. 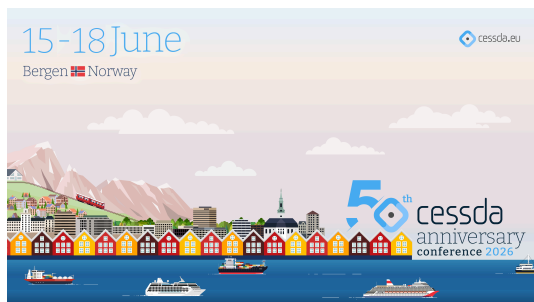
